

17 March, Freeport, Grand Bahama Island, The Bahamas 08:00 Arrival, 17:00 Departure

Freeport is aptly named; it is a duty-free port and holding area for cargo such as containers and bulk oil enroute from one place to another. One sees a substantial container port and off-shore oil-handling facilities, as well as a tank farm to hold crude oil until a purchaser is found. Despite this economic activity, Grand Bahama Island also has many pleasant areas and upscale neighborhoods.



We had booked the "Western Heritage & Snorkel Tour" excursion through Carnival. This consisted of a narrated bus tour through parts of Freeport and onto the western end of the island, with several stops. The ultimate destination was Paradise Cove Beach Resort, where we could snorkel before having the included lunch.

Our tour guide was Dwaine, and he did an excellent job of informing and entertaining us. We learned of the commercial basis for Freeport, saw homes of the rich and famous, and stopped a few times to observe natural phenomena before arriving at the resort. Sadly, the winds were high and few ventured into the water for snorkeling. Lunch of conch fritters (which taste like spicy crab cakes) and the local beer – Strongback, brewed in Freeport – prepared us for the return to the ship.

We visited the straw market next to the cruise terminal, and then stopped in Señor Frogs for a Mojito to quench our thirst. 18 March, Nassau, New Providence Island, The Bahamas 08:00 Arrival, 17:00 Departure

Nassau is the capital of the island nation of The Bahamas, with a long history including pirates and those who were chasing them. The Bahamas sit astride important sea routes between Europe and the New World, and were a strategic part of the British Empire.

We did not find a tour that interested us, so we decided to make our own. It appeared as though the most photogenic parts of Nassau were within walking distance of the cruise terminal. A short hike took us to The Queen's Steps — carved by freed slaves in honour of Queen Victoria. A brisk walk up the steps brought us to Fort Fincastle, which has a commanding view of the harbour. The cannon are now decommissioned, but would once have served to discourage or repel any who would invade.



Leaving the fort, we walked past the Governor's mansion and then down into town. After a bit of shopping, we found ourselves at Nassau's Señor Frogs and were seated at a table overlooking the bay. After lunch, we made our way back to the ship – knowing that we would return to Nassau at the end of our second cruise.

19 March, Day at Sea

After traveling south for two days, it was time to head north. Today would be a day at sea – time to read, eat, relax in the sun, or whatever. Also, a time to pack in anticipation of debarking the next morning.
